PLEASE STUDY NGC Award requirements for 2025-2026 on the <u>NGC</u> website.

SCR requirements may be found on the <u>SCR</u> website.

Your state publication or website will have your state award requirements. Double check the deadlines, states may have different deadlines.

- 1. **ELIGIBILITY**: Only federated garden clubs, members of federated garden clubs, and groups of federated clubs in good standing are eligible to apply or sponsor applicants.
- 2. AWARDS YEAR: Jan. 1st through Dec. 31 of the same year constitutes an Award Year.
- 3. SUBMIT AWARDS TO: All Awards to NGC and SCR must be submitted through your State Awards Chairman. (Check your state requirements, some states require submission through the District Awards Chairman.) For State Awards, check your state awards document for submission information, it varies with each state, some awards are submitted through the district and others are submitted to specific chairman for specific awards, others go directly to your State Awards Chairman.
- 4. ENTRIES ELIGLBE FOR BOTH NGC AND SCR AWARDS: Awards that are eligible for both NGC and SCR Awards require two separate entries prepared by the club, indicating at the top of the Award Application, which entry is for NGC and which entry is for SCR.
- 5. DEADLINE TO SUBMIT ENTRIES TO NGC: Adult NGC Award entries are submitted to NGC Awards Chairman (deadline Jan. 15), by the State Awards Chairman (check your state deadline for submission to your State Awards Chairman), with a listing of entries attached. (SCR does not send Adult Award-winning entries to the NGC level). NGC rules state that entries must be sent to NGC by State Awards Chairman.
- 6. **DEADLINE TO SUBMIT ENTRIES TO SCR:** Adult SCR Award entries must be judged in each state. Winning entries are then submitted **by the State Awards Chairman** (check your state deadline for submission to your State Awards Chairman), with a listing of entries attached, to the SCR Awards Chairman (deadline January 30).
- 7. ENTRY FORMS ARE FOUND ON THE NGC WEBSITE. PLEASE, use these forms for each Entry. Write SCR in the upper right corner for SCR Awards. Only one [1] 1st place winner from each state in each Contest. Please submit [your] Judging sheets for the entry. Competing state entries will be judged for SCR using the NGC scale of points.
- 8. **LENGTH** OF **ENTRY**: An entry may not exceed 3 pages, using front of paper only. Publications are the exception. No plastic sheet protectors allowed. No loose materials. Keep a copy of the entry for your club records. Entries will be given to SCR Director at the Conventions.

- 9. CONTEST winners in your state for Youth: Poetry, Smokey Bear & Woodsy Owl Posters, Bird Posters, Sculpture, etc., are sent to appropriate SCR Youth Chairmen, listed on the SCR Website. DO NOT send to SCR Awards Coordinator.
 - The SCR Youth Award Coordinator will send appropriate entries to the national level and a list of winners to the Awards Chairman to enter in the Awards Book.
- 10. CONTINUING PROJECTS: Entries must document and show significant work in the current awards year.
- 11. AW.ARDS: Monetary awards are offered only for designated awards. Only 1st place winners scoring 90 or above on the scoring rubrics or Scoring Sheets are eligible to receive cash awards. SPONSORS are listed with the Contest.
- 12. CATEGORIES: Clubs and states are in categories according to the number of dues paying members.

 They are as follows:

For the 2021 Awards year and beyond, the NGC Awards were changed in several categories. To align with the NGC categories, the size groups will change to reflect the NGC changes.

Award size groups are:

	Clubs	States
Small	1-20 members	1-55 clubs
Medium	21-50 members	56-149 clubs
Large	51+ members	150 + clubs

Club Yearbooks will use the same groups as listed above.

SCR 1st place, \$25 AWARD to a Single Club

NGC also divided the awards into 8 different categories to make it easier to identify available awards. SCR Award categories will follow the same categories as NGC. All of the awards are eligible for both NGC and SCR except those awards beginning with SCR and they are only available through the SCR. Remember SCR does not send Awards to NGC, only the State Awards Chairman sends Awards to NGC.

COMMUNITY ENHANCEMENTS

CE-1 COMMUNITY CONCERNS: Sponsored by: Carolyn McCabe, Jim & Linda Lawson given for the most outstanding community or religious garden project that provides green space, and/or opportunities for social gatherings, meditation, beautification, education, recreation or the growing of food.

CE-5 CIVIC DEVELOPMENT: Sponsored by Isabel Olsen, Suzy Andrego given for the most outstanding beautification project in a city, town, or neighborhood done on a continuous basis or as a special onetime event. Habitat for Humanity Projects as well as Decoration of Historic Buildings may be included.

CE-8 LANDSCAPE DESIGN: Sponsored by: Suzy Andrego given for the most significant contribution in designing a landscape plan, planning the project, and carrying out the plan.

SCR-1 ARBOR DAY DEDICATION: Sponsored by: Rose Schultz, Suzy Andrego presented for a dedication ceremony for the planting of tree/s. May be part of a new or continuing project, e.g., public buildings, highway or esplanade beautification, schools, other civic buildings. Application must show community involvement and education of the public about importance of trees. Invite some of the following: Mayor, public officials, Park & Recreation officials, FF A youth, Scouts, etc. Special consideration will be given to more unusual or unique dedications.

ENVIRONMENT & CONSERVATION:

EC-1 PROTECT OUR ENVIRONMENT: Sponsored by: Melanie Spence, April Pratt given to those conservation activities deemed overall excellent and well-balanced. Includes activities such as conservation education, legislative activities, conservation field projects, natural resource development such as watershed, erosion control, reforestation, wildlife refuge, etc.

FLORAL DESIGN:

FD-2 FLORAL DESIGN PROGRAM: Sponsored by: Dallas Fl. Show Judges Founders Group, Designers with Flair GSD given for the most outstanding program or workshop (exclusive of NGC Schools and Symposiums) teaching floral design to club members and/or the public. MAE-3 DIGITAL MEDIA PRESENTATION: Sponsored by: Clara Bishop given for the best presentation recorded and submitted on any type of digital media supporting any of the following NGC objectives: History/Archives, private or public Garden Tours, Flowers Shows, Projects, Programs, or other. MAE-4 PUBLICATION AWARD: presented for outstanding publications by (A) a club or (B) group of clubs or state. Printed publications or those prepared for electronic distribution are acceptable entries. Newsletters or state Publication/bulletins <u>must be</u> published 3 times per year or more. Judging will use the Yearbook Scoring Sheets that apply to your club rating and size found at the end of this document. (Revised 7/2023)

SCR-5 OUTSTANDING YEARBOOK THEME: Sponsored by **Rose Knight** presented to a club for the most creative use of a theme carried throughout the programs for the year, incorporating the objectives of NGC. Yearbook must be submitted that was in effect for the awards year. Creativity and originality of theme will be considered. Correlation between the theme and all club programs, projects, activities should be evident.

SERVICE & RECOGNITION:

SR-6 MEMBER AWARD OF HONOR recognizes those NGC members, whose volunteer efforts, during a period of five years have made outstanding contribution/s to club and community in one or more of the following areas: Civic Development, Conservation, Design, Horticultural Therapy, Horticulture, Landscape Design, Youth Activities, All Around Excellence. ELIGIBILITY: Any member of a state garden club, who has never served as a member of the NGC Board of Directors, including State Presidents. Guidelines and the Member Award of Honor Application Form may be found on the NGC Website, www.gardenclub.org. Complete the form, send to your state Awards Chairman by January 1st. State Awards Chair sends the application to the SCR Awards Chair by February 1st. The SCR Awards Chair will submit to the NGC Chairman by February 20th. The winning person in our region will receive an invitation to attend a function at the NGC Convention, and will be presented a certificate, a pin,

SCR-7 OUTSTANDING JUNIOR GARDEN CLUB YEARBOOK THEME: Sponsored by **Gwen DeWitt** presented to a club for the most creative use of a theme carried throughout the programs for the year, incorporating the objectives of NGC. Yearbook must be submitted that was in effect for the awards year. Creativity and originality of theme will be considered. Correlation between the theme and all club programs, projects, activities should be evident.

This NEW Award may be the Yearbook for a Junior Garden Club, or those programs included in the sponsoring Garden Club's yearbook.

This is a special award that may be awarded to a single club for the most creative landscape using herbs as the main element. Include a list of herbs used and their uses. Can be a theme garden or a container garden. This is a special award with \$50 for the best container garden. Sherie Clarkson, Herb Gardening Chair.

SCR YEARBOOK AWARD SCORING SHEETS

May be awarded for outstanding yearbooks in each of the following categories, determined by the number of members, including Life Members, on whom NGC dues are paid. Yearbooks may be accepted for competition on the calendar year or the club year (same yearbook may be submitted only one time in an awards year). Please include an NGC Application form and a 3x5 inch card with all information required. State Awards Chairman submits Yearbook winners in each category to South Central Regional Awards Chairman.

Three by Five (3x5) inch cards should contain: Award name, Name of Club, City, District, Club rating (size), Number of members, Name, address, telephone No.& Email of current club President, & dates of State and District dues were paid.

Projects: Projects involve actual membership participation that benefits the community and furthers NGC Goals and Objectives. Some Ways and Means projects (sale of bulbs, bedding plants, Herbs, etc.) may help to beautify the community as well as produce revenue for clubs. Some Ways and Means projects may help promote NGC Member Services as well as publicize our organization and goals. Certain social activities may lead to membership increase as stated in descriptions.

List continuing and new projects (a club is not required to have new projects).
 Give brief word description of projects: Include location, name of chairman, how members participate, list of donations if applicable, inkind donations if applicable, plans for maintenance if applicable, etc.
 NGC Mission Statement. List of Life Members, District, State, NGC awards won the previous year.
 Options: Clubs could fill available space. Some clubs include bylaws, budget, former Presidents. Club Theme. If theme is used, it should be evident throughout the book. Themes may be interpreted with monthly program topics and or titles, graphics, quotes. Projects do not need to be limited to theme.
