Linda Jean has dedicated years to making our community a more beautiful place to live. She continues to find ways to help others by bringing new ideas to her club, but the one I believe she deserves recognition is for working with non-profit organizations. These organizations all have different mission statements or themes and are very community oriented.

The idea she brought to the club and named the "Festival of Trees" was a contest we saw while vacationing in Destin, Florida during Christmas. Her enthusiasm for helping non-profit organizations was overwhelming and the garden club decided to give it a try in Texas. She organized the project from start to finish and by writing the guidelines, spreading the idea by word of mouth, and writing articles for the local newspaper and her contest began to take shape. She has judges from other towns come in to judge the contests using a specific scale of point system. This event is not about the most beautiful

tree, but about how the trees reflect the mission statement of each non-profit. She approached a local business and asked the General Manager to consider underwriting the cash prizes for the top winners and as they say, the rest is history. Each year she contacts him and each year he says "of course." Originally held in the local mall, the event has moved to a new venue in the downtown merchants' store windows. This award gives non-profits the opportunity to have their names mentioned in public and a chance to win cash prizes to help with the volunteer work they do. Not only do non-profit organizations benefit from the vision she had, but this event inspires the community with the Christmas spirit.

OKLAHOMA STATE PRESIDENT, April Pratt

"The FUTURE Starts with Us!"

Greetings from Oklahoma,

Oklahoma Garden Clubs has struggled to hold on for the past couple of years, just like the rest of you. Our clubs have worked hard to adjust to the new attitudes and expectations of their current members and have collaborated with other clubs to

entice new members to join.

I am impressed with the creative ways in which we are meeting and inviting prospective members. In our Southwest District, the clubs are now so spread out that it is difficult for the remaining members to travel to meetings. They recognized the need for a new club in Lawton, with a population of over 95,000, and without a club for the past 5 years. The members of all the clubs in the District held a one-day workshop at Lowe's in the city, presenting the basics of raised-bed plantings. Lowe's employees taught the workshop, and the District purchased some of the clearance plants to provide a make-and-take project. Just in that one day, they were able to identify 18 people who were very interested in a garden club. There is a follow-up workshop on herbs and dish gardens planned for next month. Another club in the South Central District added 8 new members after holding a community project. North Central District clubs joined to make wildflower seed balls at a community event and added 5 new members. We, as a State, are working on a way to help fund these membership drives with grant applications.

We held our Annual Convention recently, in Tulsa and were honored that Rose Knight attended. Along with the necessary business, there were several workshops on membership and leadership with Robin Pokorski, and other great topics with very knowledgeable presenters. At the convention, we recognized our NGC Award of Excellence – Non-Member recipient for this year, Allan Storjohann; two clubs who received NGC Plant America grant; and many more state award winners. We presented three scholarships to Oklahoma State University Horticulture students – overall, our state was able to offer almost \$15,000 in scholarships this year.

Despite the challenges we are facing, I believe our members are getting tough, getting creative, and building closer relationships with each other while they are working together. I'm excited to see what next year looks like.

SCR PENNY PINES CONTEST

2021-2023 SCR DIRECTOR ROSE KNIGHT ADMINISTRATION

Background: The NGC Penny Pines program has been an ongoing project for NGC for many years and is a cooperative effort between NGC and the USDA US Forest Service. The program provides for the reforestation of the US National Forests by providing "plantations" of native seedling trees to the region where the designated National Forest is in exchange for a \$68.00 fee. The donations are tax deductible and are in these increments because of a legal Memorandum of Understanding between NGC and the USDA US Forest Service. In our areas, the number of native tree seedlings vary per plantation as the number is determined by the cost of the seedlings.

WHO: The SCR Penny Pines Chairman is Heather White – 979-220-7545, heatherm-whitemd@aol.com. If you have questions about the contest, please feel free to contact her. Each state will be asked to have a Penny Pines Chairman to help spearhead the activity for this contest, but individual clubs can directly contribute (see HOW below).

WHAT: Donations to the Penny Pines Program will be tracked for each state in SCR, and the state with the most donations/member will win as well as the club with the absolute number of most donations. A formula for assessing donations based on state membership will be calculated from numbers obtained from NGC Headquarters.

WHEN: The time period of the May 1, 2022, through January 31, 2023. Payments and forms must be by NGC processed by NGC Headquarters within that period to be credited for this contest.

WHERE: All 4 states of South Central Region have US National Forests. In addition, donations may specify a state, ex. California, or may specify a specific forest, ex. Sequoia National Forest.

WHY: Every club and state should donate to the reforestation of our great nation with native species and preserve the beauty of our National Forests. The forest is responsible for so many aspects of environmental preservation by preventing erosion and serving as a natural barrier to weather elements such as wind, snow, and hurricanes, providing habitat for wildlife, clearing toxins and producing oxygen, as well as providing pleasure and recreation.

Tips & Techniques for Building a Proper Insect Hotel

Insect hotels have become very popular as a way to encourage beneficial insects to your garden. We all want to give Mother Nature a helping hand and provide an organic, diverse wildlife habitat. Unfortunately, with popularity comes misconceptions. There are many store-bought insect hotels that have been designed to look pretty, with colorful exteriors and a variety of spaces. Would we want to draw attention from predators to our nursery? Many times the various spaces provided are too small for insects we're trying to draw, or worse, too big; meaning access for predators of the very bugs we're trying to provide for. Many bug houses try to provide for multiple species of insects, actually helping to decimate populations due to competing predators or increase parasites. This has proven especially true for native bees and the canes used to attract them that are left unmaintained.

Below are just a few things to think about when providing an insect hotel:

- Ability to fix the bug hotel to a stable position. Ones hanging off ropes are highly unsuitable as they move in the wind.
- Smooth edged bamboo canes or tubes that are between 6-10mm in diameter. *
- * Bamboo canes are not the best material to add to an insect hotel. Solitary bees nest in tubes/canes and should always have their own habitat due reduce the risk of



predation and parasites. Also, unless the canes are sanded off to remove splinters they can actually harm solitary bees and lacewings. They are usually far too big or the wrong depth to be useful.

- When using tubes, try to use paper ones (not newspaper) that are between 6-10 mm.
- Easy access to replace materials as they biodegrade or get damaged. This is especially important for solitary bees once the juveniles have hatched to counteract parasites and disease.
- Bug hotels that haven't been treated with harsh paints or stains that can leach out and harm the insects or birds.
- A bug hotel that's accessible from at least 3 sides.
- The insect hotel should always include an overhanging roof for protection from elements.

Garden Club Hosts Mason Bee House Workshop

The Garden Club of Rogers kicked off National Garden Week a day early with a fun, hands-on project at the Rogers Museum's Family Days Event. The event, held each year, brings many Rogers resident into the downtown area for various activities, which include a black smith demonstration, face painting, candle making, petting zoo, and GCR's booth. This year the club conducted a Mason Bee House Workshop. This drop by workshop instructed children (or adults) on how to make a mason bee house using a swim noodle and paper straws. Club members were on hand to assist the children in making the houses and teaching them about the mason bees. They learned about the importance of mason bees as pollinators, how they lay their eggs and where to site the houses for the best results. Since mason bees are solitary bees and do not defend hives or stores of honey, they are gentle and rarely sting, making them safe around kids and pets. In all, 179 houses were constructed, giving mason bees many more places to nest. A display of pollinator plants helped to decorate the booth as well as bees made from recycled products. Pollinator flower seeds and USDA pamphlets on pollinators were handed out. Our Friendly Bookstore donated books on gardening for the children also.

Cost to make 200 Mason Bee houses from noodles was about \$85. Noodles were purchased from Wal-Mart for 98 cents and Dollar Tree for \$1.25. Paper straws were ordered from Amazon.
